Affordable Naloxone for California

Naloxone (naloxone hydrochloride) nasal spray is a life-saving medication designed to rapidly reverse the effects of a life-threatening opioid emergency by blocking the effects of opioids. It can restore normal breathing within two to three minutes in a person whose breath has slowed, or even stopped, because of an overdose from opioids. It is now available as an over-the-counter (OTC) medication and does not need a prescription for use. Naloxone Distribution Project (NDP)

Qualifying organizations in California can get OTC 4 mg naloxone nasal spray and intramuscular 3 mg naloxone for **free** through the Department of Health Care Services' (DHCS) Naloxone Distribution Project. CalRx® \$24 Naloxone

The CalRx® program, in collaboration with Amneal Pharmaceuticals, offers OTC 4 mg naloxone nasal spray to California businesses and organizations at **\$24 per twin-pack**. This opportunity also extends to NDP-eligible entities looking to buy extra naloxone. Participating entities must agree to certain requirements, like a prohibition against resale.
